Common Questions on Supplemental Services

Where does the provider offer tutoring services?

Providers may offer services in a variety of settings including schools, public libraries, providers' offices, community centers and places of worship. Some providers may also offer internet-based instruction that students can access through a computer at home. Transportation to the provider is the responsibility of the parent. In some cases, a provider may offer these services.

When does the provider offer services?

Students can receive tutoring services after school, before school, or at other times. Make sure the services are scheduled at a time that works for your family so that your child will be able to attend regularly.

How often and how long will my child receive tutoring?

This can vary, from every day to a few times a week. Make sure you know how many sessions the provider will offer, and how long the sessions will continue.

How are students grouped during tutoring?

Providers offer different types of instruction. Some providers tutor small groups of students at a time, while others offer one-on-one instruction or teach through computer programs. Other providers may use a combination of these approaches. Be sure to choose a provider that offers instruction in a way that will work best for your child.

What is the provider's track record in raising student achievement?

Providers must provide information to parents and teachers regarding academic progress. This evidence can be in the form of:

- results on tests developed by the provider, state, or district
- satisfaction surveys of students or parents
- improved classroom grades
- improved attendance rates
- better homework completion

Who will be instructing my child? What are their qualifications?

Supplemental service providers are not required to hire certified teachers. However, you should make sure you are confident that each instructor's level of experience and knowledge has prepared him or her to help your child improve academically.

Do supplemental education service providers meet learning needs outside of mainstream students?

Some providers may offer services in languages other than English, serve disabled learning conditions and other specialized services. It is the responsibility of the parent to explore these needs with the individual supplemental service provider.
